# World Alzheimer's Month September 2023

Alzheimer's Disease is a type of dementia, and is in fact the most common cause of dementia today. Whilst the cause of Alzheimer's is unknown, it is known that is causes the brain to begin to 'degenerate'.



However, there is a lot of misinformation surrounding Alzheimer's, and dementia as a whole, and a diagnosis does not mean that you can't continue to live well with this disease.



The thought of having Alzheimer's can be scary, but with the right care and support in place—whether this be a good, strong support system around you, or having carers come in to help you retain as much of your independence as possible—and with some adjustments to your home environment as and when needed, there is no reason why you can't continue to enjoy life.



Sometimes, these adjustments can be removing dark colours and perhaps reducing the number of mirrors you may have, as Alzheimer's can cause a loss of depth-perception, and these can look like voids and holes on the floor and in the wall. Some people find using post-it notes around their home also helps them to remember where things are. Some people find other things work, and it can be a case of trial and error to find out what helps the most, but there are professionals who are able to help, and services available such as memory cafes, to help provide support and advice to you and/or your loved ones.

As of 20th August 2023, our staff have provided 10,204 hours of care across 13,303 visits so far this year! 2023 has also seen us welcome our 150th client since we first started in 2016.

Moreover, since beginning in 2016, our staff have provided just over 88,841 hours of care across 112,827 visits. This is alongside over 4,212 hours of training in that same time frame!

# The Training Insider

All of our wonderful staff have to undergo regular training in order to safely carry out their jobs.

But what exactly are in these sessions? Sophia, who delivers all of our in-house training, gives us a bit of insight into one of the subjects:

How often are our staff trained in this subject?

Is there an example question from the sessions that you can give us?

Firstly, we are not able to call ourselves
 'first aiders' due to the course only
 covering basic first aid for work. The
 course covers CPR, how to help spot
 signs of things such as a heart attack, a
 stroke, diabetes, effects of hot and cold
 but with the added main focus on who
 to call and how to get the appropriate
 help when needed.

We train staff during their initial induction training, then update every 3 years; unless we are informed of a chance of practice then we would update everyone as soon as possible.


As a memory aid to remember what concussion is and its affects, I like to ask the question 'which animal cannot get concussion?'... a woodpecker.



'Breathing, Bleeding, Burns & Bones'

# Through the Filing Cabinet

Our 'Useful Information' drawer is chock-a-block with useful things we've found over the years. In this edition of 'Through the Filing Cabinet', Joseph explores two randomly-chosen topics from the drawer...





#### Parkinson's

Parkinson's is a progressive neurological condition, and is caused by a lower level of dopamine in the brain than what would be expected, usually because the nerve cells that produce it have stopped working.

There are multiple forms of Parkinson's and parkinsonism, but the main three are 'idiopathic Parkinson's' (which means the cause is unknown), vascular parkinsonism (which means the cause is a reduced blood-flow to the brain), and drug-induced parkinsonism (which means it is caused by the administration of certain drugs and medications).

Parkinson's UK has a lot of information regarding Parkinson's, and where you can find support if needed. Their website is parkinsons.org.uk, and their helpline is O808 800 0303.

#### **TEPs**

A TEP (Treatment Escalation Plan) is a form that communicates a person's wishes should they suddenly deteriorate or otherwise become very unwell—this is in regards to whether they want to be admitted to hospital, be put into the Intensive Care Unit, or whether they wish to be treated at home etc.

It also asks the question, in the event that the person's heart stops beating, whether they wish to receive CPR, or be kept as comfortable as possible, and for their medical team to 'Allow a Natural Death (Do Not Attempt Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation)'.

It states very clearly at the top that a TEP 'is for clinical guidance and it does not replace clinical judgement'.


